As we approach the celebration of Pentecost 2024 we have an opportunity to reflect where we are seeing the movement of the Holy Spirit in our world today.

Over the last couple of months I have had the opportunity to share the good news of Jesus Christ with people from diverse cultures and religious traditions all passionate and committed to creating a world where all can live in peace and harmony. The Holy Spirit is truly moving in places where we least expect, often in places where Christianity is the minority tradition but where the message of Jesus is being proclaimed in the love, hope and peace that is being lived out. In March I attended the Global Spirituality Mahotsav (which means 'gathering') in Hyderabad, India where

over 70000 people gathered to listen and learn from each other and to pray together for peace and harmony in the world. This week in Malaysia I have attended the International Religious Leaders Conference on Unity in Diversity.

The second speaker this morning was Cor Episopa Philip Tomas the Chairman Christian Federation of Malaysia who reminded the over 2000 people present that 'diversity is a gift from God' he quoted from Paul's letter to the Galatians 'we are one body in Christ' Thanks to God for the many ways that the Holy Spirit is moving in the world and may we all in our own lives listen to the Holy Spirit, living within you and live the way of Jesus so that all may know that 'you are my disciples' (John 13:35)

Rural and Remote Committee

On Monday 22 April, 15 passionate supporters and interested parties members of churches in the Downs. Presbytery leaders, ministers from Brisbane, Frontier Services [interstate], Connect100+, also another denomination, and of course the RAMs Bush Chaplains - joined together for a Zoom meeting to create a Rural and Remote Committee. Rev Dona Spencer and Ps Jennie Feldmeier, the RAMs Bush Chaplains, are to have support teams. Aims were reviewed in a draft Charter, which had kindly been drawn up by Dr Warren Midgley during his Easter break.

It was decided that a smaller working group [not yet named] would give support to the Bush Chaplains more often, and a larger group would meet biannually to oversee budgets & wider strategy.

Many key points were made, e.g. the desire to:

- allow flexibility in the different expressions of ministry by different Chaplains
- pivot to meet changing community needs
- work alongside other ministries & agencies so as not to replicate services
- invite community members for their input
- increase the profile and success of RAMs in spreading love & the message of the Gospel

Birdsville Update with Ps Jennie Feldmeier, Bush Chaplain CBW

Pastor Jennie Feldmeier, Bush Chaplain at remote area CBW, shared about a trip with Gordon Preston, a volunteer from Outback Links, to Birdsville on April 17th for a massive effort to clean, repair and restore the old Australian Inland Mission [AIM] hospital. Various rebuilds of the AIM served the community "for 101 years until 2005 when the last nurse walked next door to the new QLD Health Clinic. It then operated as a museum until 2017, when it was sold. Jenna Brooks, a Birdsville identity, acquired it in 2020, determined to again open the hospital so that tourists can marvel at its resilience and role in the community's health needs."

Ps Jennie writes, "we have had some locals come through, some walked the corridors with tears in their eyes as they remembered being cared for by nurses, telling us stories of broken arms, birthing babies and having the 'birds & bees' explained to them by the nursing sisters."

"It is clear to see the positive impact Frontier Services is having in the community by once again being back in Birdsville." Ps Jennie quotes a local who said, "Thanks for turning up, we are a long way out here and don't see many helpers and others volunteering to look after our community. Hope you are gonna stay!"

Mural Update at Wallumbilla with Rev Dona Spencer, Bush Chaplain

Mariangela Bonasia Lewis, Artist-inresidence at Wallumbilla Primary, above left, is hard at work with Rev Dona Spencer, the Bush Chaplain from the Bottle Tree RRM, to coordinate the students designing & painting a large mural in 8 panels - which will be 9.6m long and 1.8m high! [right above] Rev Dona says, 'We have collected drawings from all children!! 120...or thereabouts. Grades 1 to 10.' An element of everyone's designs will be incorporated, and all 120 will help with the painting. Mariangela's husband, Chris Lewis, is also

assisting. Perhaps it's just 'all in a day's work' for mural artists, but to most people, it looks like a *massive* undertaking needing artists' eyes to compose the design from the wealth of choice in the children's 120 original artworks, then project the images by overhead transparency, then to artfully transfer outlines and prepare paints to be ready for the children when they started painting on 22nd April.

Watch this space for a 'big reveal' of this masterpiece/community engagement project - when the 120+ artists have finished!

with Rev Tanya Richards, Community Chaplain and Connect 100+ Toowoomba

Past President of UC National Assembly Dr Deidre Palmer and Rev Charissa Suli offered the following reflection on the reading from Luke 24: 13- 35, about the role of the church and Christians as we support and listen to people and families experiencing DFV. On the road to Emmaus, Jesus comes alongside the disciples in their fear, confusion and brings a message of hope that the impossible may in fact be possible. As families and individuals live in sadness, confusion, distress and isolation, the risen Christ comes alongside and reminds us that we are his beloved children, we are created in his image, and we are of infinite value.

As Christians we are called to walk alongside, to listen, to offer hope and compassion as we "notice the suffering of another and to take action to alleviate that suffering." Like the Good Samaritan, we are called to attend to our neighbours, friends and family. We have a narrative of hope to which we witness, of a God who loves us infinitely and desires us to be in loving, lifegiving relationships with others. We have a responsibility, as followers of Jesus, to be bearers of this hope.

HOW CAN YOU HELP!

CHECK IN. Check in with anyone you know, or suspect has experienced DFV and see how they are doing but do it sensitively and carefully. Make sure it's a safe space for the survivor whilst checking in with them.

LISTEN. Be open to learning from others who have more expertise and experience before you speak, think: have you really listened?

SPEAK OUT. Join the conversation and use your voice to speak out against DFV. We all have role to play in ending violence.

ACT. Give your time to an organisation or group that works to prevent and address gender-based violence. Raise the awareness in your local church community and where to get help.

Winter Homeless Shelter at St Stephen's Uniting Church (SSUC)

From Venue Coordinator, Shaaron Currie - 5th June is first night at SSUC

St Stephens UC is once again opening our Church Hall to the most vulnerable in our community who are sleeping rough. Every Wednesday afternoon we welcome up to 12 Guests.

On a typical afternoon:

- 3pm The team arrive to set up, make beds and prepare the evening meal.
- 5pm The Evening Shift arrives ready for the bus to arrive at
- 5.30pm Guests arrive and are
 welcomed with a hot cuppa and home
 baking which is sometimes their first
 meal of the day. Soup is served. Guests
 will shower or just lie down & relax. A
 game of UNO or chess is played.
- 6.30pm we share a meal together.
- 10pm the church hall is locked and the Night Shift come in to take over.
- 6am Breakfast is prepared, beds are packed ready for the bus.
- 8am Guests are taken into town.

'I honestly didn't know what I had signed up for. 4 years on I have met some amazing volunteers & made some amazing friendships...one of our Shift Leaders...is a past Guest who has since found housing.'

The Guests are so appreciative of the hospitality. It's a very rewarding experience being involved in WinterShelter.

- Help out with the endless amount of washing we get. [Each week 3 Volunteers are rostered on to do the washing. Some Volunteers have an outing to the local laundromat together.]
- We are in desperate in need of NIGHTSHIFT VOLUNTEERS. This shift has 3 Volunteers rostered on with 2 Volunteers awake at all times. There is plenty of home baking & chocolate on offer to get you through the night. In the past we've had a uni student who studied all night & slept all day...
